**CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS****1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation**

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Sri Ramakrishna College of Arts & Science for Women, Coimbatore, being an affiliated institution to Bharathiar University, adopt the choice based credit system framed by the University from the academic year 2008-2009. The courses for the respective semesters are allotted to the faculty well in advance based on their experience and expertise in the subjects concerned. They are requested to prepare lesson plan for the courses allotted for the ensuing semester. Based on the lesson plan, faculty need to document its execution individually for all the courses consisting of topics covered, contents delivered and activities carried out by them in chronological order. Head of the department mentors the faculty and ensures the progress and completion of syllabi. Faculty are motivated to deliver the curriculum by adopting various modes of ICT like Power point presentations, videos, open e-resources, NPTEL etc., Group discussions and quiz programmes using online tools like Kahoot and Hot potatos are conducted for the benefit of the student community. A Course file should be prepared for each subject containing details such as study material, question bank, innovative and best practices followed, and contents covered beyond syllabi, internal and model exam question paper with schemes, consolidated mark statement and result analysis. Answer key for the internal and model question paper been prepared are displayed using QR(Quick Response) codes. Feedback on curriculum collected from the stakeholders, namely students, teachers, alumni and parents are analysed and suitable suggestions are represented to the Board of studies to make appropriate corrective measures. Course feedback will be collected by the respective faculty for each course handled by them in order to find out the deficiency if any. Individual faculty feedback is collected by the class tutors and analysis of the same is carried out and necessary remedial actions are taken by the concerned head of the department.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The college is affiliated to Bharathiar University and the Internal Evaluation system is prescribed by the Bharathiar University. The institution follows the guidelines of the University. The Continuous Internal Evaluations include internal tests, model exam and assignments. In the assignment component, the college has encouraged the students to complete a self learning programme under Massive Open Online Course as a special initiative of our institution. The students complete a minimum of one course per semester as a part of this initiative. Continuous Internal Examination has been centralised. Some of the examination reforms include: 1. Standardised question paper format is followed for the internal and model 2. Examination with the specification of the course outcome. 3. Each question is linked with the course outcome. 4. Answer keys with mark allocation are prepared and published in the notice board immediately after the internal and model tests. 5. Online examination is introduced. 6. New system of codification has been introduced for answer books. 7. The results of the internal and model tests are analysed to plan for remedial action for slow learners.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The Academic Calendar is prepared well in advance for the entire year and published annually. **LIBRARY PROCEDURE** The college library is kept open from morning 8.30 A.M to 5.00 P.M on all working days. The students are permitted inside the library only with their identity cards. Two computers are located at the entrance to

help the students search the books. The books are indexed using the OPAC system. The under graduate students are allowed to borrow two books and the post graduate and research scholars are allowed to borrow four books at a time. The collection of journals and their back issues are available easily. The magazine and news paper section is comfortably located to facilitate the students. The books are secured using the bar codes for issue and return. The reprographic services present in the library permit the students to take the copies of the reference materials. Through Infilbnet online journals are available for the users. The faculty / students can access the eresources from their respective department through internet facilities. The library committee functions with principal as its chairman. It gives guidelines and suggestions for the improvement of the infrastructure and purchase of books, reference books, approving the budget, prepared by the librarian and the staff. The advisory committee meets twice a year. Maintenance and utilization of the Infrastructure Facilities: College has well established system procedure for maintenance and utilization of available supporting facilities. The college has adequate number of Lab facilities with all required chemicals, glasswares and equipment's which are maintained properly as and when required. All the stakeholders have equal opportunity to use those facilities as per the rules and the policies of the institution. All the fire equipment are regularly upgraded as and when required by the local party. **Examination and Evaluation**

A Standard Procedure is been set for the preparation and display of timetable, submission of question paper to the exam cell and for the conduct of Examination. Outcome based education is followed in preparation of the question paper. Evaluation of answer scripts within three days and providing feedback to students on performance. Remedial classes / test are conducted for the students based on their performance. Advanced learners are encouraged to follow more reference books and journals to gain an insight into the topic. Women Empowerment Sri Ramakrishna College of Arts and Science for Women has an academic heritage of 28 years. It aims in providing Financial Empowerment, Physical Empowerment, Legal Empowerment and Spiritual Empowerment thereby transforming them into holistic individuals who can contribute to business, society and nation building as per the vision of the college. Financial empowerment is achieved through functioning of college in shift system enabling students to take up part time jobs. The Entrepreneur Development Cell of the college train students to shoulder the family financial responses by means of food and stationery stalls as well as camps. Around 46 stalls have been put up by students and 100 students were involved. Added to this, students are educated to open bank account and a visit to postal office is arranged for cultivating saving habits in students. Physical empowerment is facilitated by the activities of Physical department and Health club apart from the activities by Eco club, RRC, YRC, NSS, Consumer Club and department associations. All students are members of Women Empowerment cell which actively involves in the holistic development of women. Awareness camps, Health check up camps, Rally, Lecture sessions are conducted at college and in public with the involvement of faculty and students assisted by medical team of Sri Ramakrishna Hospital. Self defence classes are also conducted for students. Legal empowerment is focussed to a greater extent as our Institution is exclusively for women. Anti ragging awareness programme is arranged for senior students. Cyber security and legal rights are made known to them through lecture sessions. Anti ragging cell, Grievance and Redressal cell and Mentoring have contributed in making the college known as anti ragging free campus. Spiritual empowerment is one of the major goals of the Institution, as the Institution itself belongs to SNR sons Charitable Trust, which is formed by the trust members who are ardent devotees of Sri Ramakrishna Paramahansa. It is mandatory for all the students to practice superbrain yoga every day before the commencement of classes. Kayakalpam workshop is arranged for students. Yoga classes are conducted and 440 students attended. Focus on empowering women financially, physically, legally and spiritually has facilitated the college to be marked as a distinctive women's Institution. Overall the Institution strives for developing empowered women who will contribute for the betterment of their families and Nation at large.
